#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

#### 1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial report are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

In the context of a not-for-profit charitable organisation, all references to "profit" and "loss" have been changed to "surplus" and "deficit".

#### (a) Basis of preparation

These general-purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with AASB 1060 General Purpose Financial Statements - Simplified Disclosures for For-Profit and Not-for-Profit Tier 2 Entities which came into effect for accounting periods beginning on or after 30 June 2022, and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 ('ACNC Act').

In accordance with the special resolution passed in May 2011, the memberships, assets and liabilities of Bird Observation & Conservation Australia and the Royal Australasian Ornithologists Union were merged with BirdLife Australia on 1 January 2012. Bird Observation & Conservation Australia and the Royal Australasian Ornithologists Union have ceased to trade, but continue as registered companies, their purpose in the group being to receive bequests and ensure these are used to progress the shared objectives of the Group in accordance with the wishes of the bequestor, where stipulated.

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### (b) Principles of consolidation

The financial report covers Bird Observation & Conservation Australia as an individual parent entity. In 2011, the financial report covered Bird Observation & Conservation Australia and the consolidated group of the parent and the controlled entity Australian Bird Environment Foundation. As control of Australian Bird Environment Foundation passed to BirdLife on 1 January 2012, no consolidated financial report has been prepared. Bird Observation & Conservation Australia is a Company limited by guarantee incorporated and domiciled in Australia

### (c) Income tax

Owing to an exemption granted by the Australian Taxation Authorities, no provision for income tax is necessary.

# (d) Employee benefits

All employees transferred to BirdLife Australia effective 1 January 2012.

#### (e) Cash and cash equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cashflows, cash includes deposits at call which are readily convertible to cash on hand and which are used in the cash management function on a day-to-day basis, net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

#### 1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### (f) Members' guarantee

As a Company limited by Guarantee, in the event of the Company being wound up, the liability of the members is limited to \$20 for each membership. There was 1 member at 31 December 2023 and 2022.

### (g) New, Revised or Amending Accounting Standards or Interpretations

The company has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

#### 2. MERGER WITH BIRDLIFE

In accordance with the special resolutions passed in May 2011, the memberships, assets and activities of Bird Observation & Conservation Australia and the Royal Australasian Ornithologists Union were merged with BirdLife Australia. Assets and liabilities were transferred at their written down values as at 1 January 2012.
